ICS delivers hope to the Bay Area's Italian Community


Pietro Bonanno heads up one of the oldest Italian nonprofits in the country, Italian Community Services (ICS), was founded by AP Giannini and other Italian pioneers in 1916. Bonanno is also a proud new member of Branch 1 in San Francisco. He wants to be sure our members are aware of the assistance offered by ICS.

While San Francisco's shelter-in-place order further isolated senior citizens and increased food insecurity, Italian Community Services (ICS) provides hope by caring for the Bay Area's Italian community. ICS has provided:

- 4,700 wellness phone calls to Bay Area seniors
- Over 2,100 care packages delivered to community members in need
- 620 errands completed (supermarket, pharmacy, etc.)

The global pandemic has affected everyone but has left society's most vulnerable citizens in a terrible situation. Instead of ICS opening its doors weekly for seniors, to socialize and grab food from its food pantry, its volunteers knocked on their doors carrying care packages with fresh produce, activities, flowers, and information about services and Covid-19. They have delivered over 2,100 care packages to seniors and others in need like the recently unemployed. The deliveries are not just a box of sustenance but a confirmation that the individual is safe.

While the seniors receive a gift from ICS, the volunteers also benefit as Denise Accurso stated "This is such a

rewarding and fulfilling experience. What ICS is doing goes beyond providing food as sustenance. It is reaching the hearts of our Italian elders who deserve to be cared for and honored and treasured. Lifting their spirits during these times means so much. I am honored to be a volunteer to help with this great mission." The Italian community bonds through caring for each other.

Since senior citizens can no longer attend weekly activities at Italian

Community Service's Club Fugazi, ICS volunteers have made over 4,700 wellness calls to seniors. In the best of times, social isolation is a serious issue for senior citizens but with the additional overlay of a pandemic it can lead to anxiety and depression causing seniors to stop taking their medicine or eating food. The calls provide an opportunity for the seniors to socialize and request additional services like prescription refills or grocery shopping. As one volunteer said "... each senior is a case by itself for background and personality. . . . [I] call every day to the ones who I know are more vulnerable by the loneliness and lack of family. Each call provides hope to a senior and often inspiration to a volunteer.

The pandemic forced ICS to reflect on its services and the needs of the community. ICS began as an organization to help Italian immigrants adjust to America. And while it still does that, it now also provides social inclusion and solidarity at a very difficult time. Seniors and unemployed community members, many from Italian restaurants, need food and Italian restaurants and Italian businesses need customers.

The International Council on Active Aging offers 10 ways to stay connected during COVID-19. I have summarized a few below.

Pick up the telephone and call someone. Members should call one another, especially those they know who live alone and are isolated. An officer in the branch could create a phone tree, which members can use to contact one another. Reaching out and taking care of one another is one of the most important things we can do right now.

Use technology to connect with family and friends. A branch or district can use Facebook, FaceTime, Zoom, Skype, or WhatsApp to hold meetings and to keep in touch. You could host a movie night, Sunday supper or Happy Hour. At this year's annual convention, around 100 ICF members joined together on Zoom to chat, play games, sing, and hold a raffle. These gatherings can be as structured as you want, perhaps more structured for a branch meeting to a less structured and more informal for a Happy Hour. The ICF Central Council has purchased a Zoom account, and if you would like me to set up a meeting for you, I would be glad to help. Just contact me at vpiro@icloud.com.

So, I ask again. What's going on? Has God abandoned us? Of course not! God loves us.


"I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to myself, so that where I am you also may be." (Jn 14:2-3)




Mother Cabrini Shrine

Xavier Cabrini, a co-patron saint of the Italian Catholic Federation, was born in Sant'Angelo Lodigiano in the province of Lombardy, northern Italy, on

July 15, 1850. She was a major benefactor for Italian immigrants in the U.S., and the first naturalized US citizen to be declared a saint (July 7, 1946).

In 1916 Mother Cabrini built a small chapel in honor of the Blessed Mother atop Mount Raphael, for the residents of the San Fernando Valley. She made daily mediation visits to the chapel.

For decades, the chapel attracted thousands of pilgrims who made the steep climb every December to honor Mother Cabrini. In 1973, the chapel was moved down the mountain to St. Francis Xavier Church in Burbank where it was restored.


Planning for Success with Membership Recruitment and Retention

Family Recipes

Hope you are continuing to stay safe and healthy.

One day a friend from work mentioned she was going home to make Mu Shu Pork for dinner. That was my mom's fa-



vorite dish to order when we were having Chinese Food. So of course I asked her for the recipe. It is not difficult to make and certainly delicious. It also goes without saying that it is a big hit with my nephew Tony!



Mu Shu Pork

Marinade Ingredients:

1/2 cup hoisin sauce
1/4 cup rice vinegar
2 Tbls. oyster sauce
2 Tbls. soy sauce
1 tsp. toasted sesame oil
6 cloves garlic, minced

freshly cracked black pepper

Mu Shu Ingredients:

1 pound boneless pork chops (or boneless skinless chicken breasts), sliced into very thin strips (I put in freezer to firm up the meat, made it much easier to slice thin)

- 3 Tbls. peanut or vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs, whisked
- 1 (14 oz.) bag coleslaw (or ½ a cabbage) 8 ounces shiitake mushrooms, stemmed and thinly sliced (I used crimini)
- 4 scallions, thinly sliced-green part only (I usually forget to buy them)

To make the marinade: Whisk all ingredients together in a medium mixing bowl until combined. Separate the marinade into two portions—one to marinade the meat and one to use in the cooking process.

To make the Mu Shu Pork:

- 1. Add the thinly sliced pork (or chicken) to half the marinade. Toss until meat is evenly coated. Set aside for 5 minutes. (I might do this step hours ahead of time)
- 2. While meat is marinating, over medium heat—heat 1 Tbls. oil in a large sauté pan or wok. Add the whisked eggs, and let them sit until cooked. Will form a large omelet. Transfer the omelet to a separate cutting board, cut into small thin pieces.
- 3. Return the pan to the stove, increase heat to high. Add 1 Tbls. oil. With use of tongs or fork lift meat out of marinade and transfer to the pan, discarding the marinade. Sauté the meat breaking it up and stirring occasionally, until cooked and tender, about 3-4 minutes. Transfer meat with tongs to a separate plate/bowl, discard excess juice and set aside.
- 4. Add the remaining 1 Tbls. oil to the pan, along with the cabbage, mushrooms and half of the scallions. Sauté for 2-3 minutes or until cabbage begins to wilt and softens. Drain excess liquid.
- 5. Add in the reserved marinade, toss to combine. Cook for an additional 2 minutes. Stir in the cooked meat and

chopped eggs. Toss to combine. Taste and season with salt and pepper or additional hoisin or soy sauce. Sprinkle with remaining green onions.

For serving: rice wraps, flour tortillas, lettuce cups (romaine), egg cauliflower wraps (found in Costco), on rice.

Optional toppings: extra hoisin, soy sauce, thinly sliced scallions, toasted sesame seeds.

With this recipe I discovered Hoisin Sauce. Wow--what I have been missing out on in life-great sauce-great flavor?! We use the lettuce leaves when we enjoy this meal and it is great left over for lunch. Add some stir fried vegetables and/or BBQ Chinese Ribs (coming in a future *Bollettino*) and the meal is complete.

Several members have shared recipes with me—you have not been forgotten. I look forward to sharing with you in the near future. Be safe and call friends—it can be lonely sheltering in place.


The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire and the Fight for Workers' Rights

By by Julie Gilbert (Author), Orban Janos (Illustrator)

In November 1909, thousands of factory workers walked off the job to protest the terrible working conditions in New York City factories. Joining the picket lines was dangerous, with thugs and police officers harassing picketers, but the protests stirred action. Many factory owners finally agreed to some of the workers' demands and improved conditions. But nothing changed for workers at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory, and those workers would pay



a high price for the company's dangerous conditions. In 1911, a devastating fire swept through the Triangle factory, killing 146 workers. In the months following the tragedy, the rights of workers finally gained real traction as the state government formed a safety commission and enacted new safety laws.






Last week...poor air quality.,,, back to virtual reality!

The 14-day ocean voyage was hard, and then we went on to the Ellis Island Clearance, and finally, the five-day train trip from New York to California. How difficult this must have been for this woman alone with a small child and with no knowledge of the English language.

Rosa was unable physically to adjust to Newman's very hot summers and cold winters. She became ill and it was recommended that the family move to a milder climate. They purchased a home in Santa Cruz, where weather conditions were similar to their native Sorrento and where there were several

Our Branch lost a lovely member, Andreina Casagrande, in August at the age of 84. Please pray for the repose of Andreina's soul and keep her family in your prayers.






